Mary, the Mother of Jesus

Extract of the Sermon by Guest Preacher the Reverend Leigh Gardiner at St Luke's, 18 August 2019

When I was teenager I was an active, passionate Christian involved in leadership of our Inter-School Christian Fellowship group and Bible studies, part of a youth group etc. In my mid-20's I went off on a prodigal journey for a few years. During that period of deliberately turning away from God I also travelled, and it was while I was living and working in London that I came back to God. The church where that happened was a Baptist one and since my return to Australia I've worshipped and worked in a Uniting Church congregation, a Baptist Church, and while working at that Baptist church as a worship coordinator, I commenced theological studies at Charles Sturt University.

It transpired that I moved to Canberra to study on campus at St Mark's, where I shared some classes with the Reverend Susan Bridge, whom many of you will know, and I distinctly remember saying to someone "the funniest thing would be if God turned me into an Anglican Priest"... and you can guess what happened!

That in itself wasn't a simple journey and there were specific and significant moments, and I would now say sacred moments, which guided and enabled that journey.

Each of us has a story of faith. For some of us it may be that we were brought up in the church and have always known, and had a relationship, with God. For others, we may think of a particular occasion where we first invited Christ into our lives. And perhaps for all of us, we can look back and see some specific, significant moments, that we may declare 'sacred'.

If you've never thought about your own story of faith, never for instance, done a timeline of significant moments in your own journey of faith, then I'd like to encourage you to consider doing so. And there are several reasons:

Mary, the Mother of Jesus

- 1. When our faith is shaken those moments often provide an anchor point.
- 2. They help us tell our own story.
- 3. They are a witness to the Gospel, the good news of Jesus.

We sang this morning of Mary's anguish at the cross. How might Mary have needed to remember those specific and significant moments, those sacred moments? Not only when she was a teenager, but when she was at a wedding with Jesus and told him to sort out the wine issue. And she presumably witnessed, and certainly was told about, other miracles and aspects of his ministry. Her grief would not have diminished, but her faith, perhaps shaken, perhaps full of questions, had anchor points.

What are your faith anchor points? Or alternatively, why are you still a Christian? Not why or how did you come to faith, but why are you *still* a Christian?

In answering that question you might find other anchor points, you might articulate existential responses, you might think of the saints or the community of faith or about social justice, and if we were to write up a list of everyone's responses it would be a varied list. And that is *your* story. And *your* story is not only important, it's essential for the continuation of the church.

In recent years, marketing strategies have turned more and more to the power of story. Universities such as Stanford run courses in storytelling. I read a Forbes article which stated "Look at any great enterprise and invariably its mission drives its strategy, not the other way around. And it all starts with a story."

Mary's story, your story and my story, are part of the larger narrative of God's redemptive and reconciling work. At the Lord's Table, we re-tell part of Jesus' story, and for many of us participating in the Eucharist regularly is one of those anchor points for us.

We celebrate Mary's faithfulness and willingness. We know that she was loved by God and chosen for a particular purpose. The few verses we heard today from *Galatians* (4:4-7) remind us that we, too, are loved by God and chosen for a purpose. The work of Jesus is not only about freeing us but adopting us so that we are family, we are heirs of all that is God's. We cry out, just as Jesus did, "Abba! Father!"

Our broken world needs to know God's love, but our world is full of competing, and often very loud voices, and people understandably put on their headphones (often literally) and exclude the world. It is over coffee or a meal, within the context of authentic relationships, that ears are opened and we have opportunities to share our story, including our faith story. Many of us think "I don't have a story worth sharing", or "no-one wants to listen to me". Actually, I'd like to suggest you do.

I wonder if you might do something. I invite you to look at your hands.

Your hands have their stories:

of touching lives...

of holding pain...

of embracing...

of planting seeds and tending gardens...

of closing in anger...

of opening and welcoming...

of reaching out and of being received...

of cleaning, washing, mopping, scrubbing...

of work of all sorts.

Hands that are wrinkled and scarred.

Hands that have worked for justice.

Hands that reach out for the bread and the cup.

Hands that hold the promise of the future.

I wonder if you might now put your hands on your heart. For these stories of your hands are also the stories of your heart. And they are the stories that people want to hear and remember; and many of them, those anchor point stories, point to God's story. For while we honour Mary's faithfulness today, our broken world needs our faithfulness, too.
