

The Service of the Light

The Lord be with you. And also with you.

Christ is Risen, Alleluia! **He is risen indeed! Alleluia!**

Today we celebrate the day when our Lord Jesus Christ passed from death to life.

Throughout the world Christians celebrate the awesome power of God.

As we hear the story of his resurrection, and proclaim all that God has done, we can be confident that we shall share his victory over death and live with him for ever.

The new Paschal (Easter) Candle is then brought to the Priest who traces the cross and then the Greek letter Alpha above and the Greek letter Omega below. The numbers of the current year are marked in the space between the arms of the cross.

Five nails are then inserted into the candle, reminding us of the five wounds of Christ. The Priest lights the Paschal Candle, saying:

May the light of Christ, rising in glory, banish all darkness from our hearts and minds.

The Priest then raises the Candle and says:

The light of Christ!

The Ministry of the Word

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

For I am about to create new heavens and a new earth; the former things shall not be remembered or come to mind. But be glad and rejoice forever in what I am creating; for I am about to create Jerusalem as a joy, and its people as a delight. I will rejoice in Jerusalem, and delight in my people; no more shall the sound of weeping be heard in it, or the cry of distress. No more shall there be in it an infant that lives but a few days, or an old person who does not live out a lifetime; for one who dies at a hundred years will be considered a youth, and one who falls short of a hundred will be considered accursed. They shall build houses and inhabit them; they shall plant vineyards and eat their fruit. They shall not build and another inhabit; they shall not plant and another eat; for like the days of a tree shall the days of my people be, and my chosen shall long enjoy the work of their hands. They shall not labour in vain, or bear children for calamity; for they shall be offspring blessed by the Lord - and their descendants as well. Before they call I will answer, while they are yet speaking I will hear. The wolf and the lamb shall feed together, the lion shall eat straw like the ox; but the serpent - its food shall be dust! They shall not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain, says the Lord.

Hymn to the Risen Christ

A reading from the Book of Acts

Then Peter began to speak to them: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ - he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

Pour out your Holy Spirit in blessing and sanctify this water so that it may be a sign of our new birth in Baptism. May we continue for ever in Jesus Christ our Lord, in the unity of the Spirit, now and for ever. **Amen.**

Dear friends, through the paschal mystery we have been buried with Christ in his baptism, so that we may rise with him to new life. Now that our Lenten observance is ended, let us reaffirm the promises we made in baptism.


Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.'


Deacon: Let us proclaim the mystery of faith:

The Breaking of the Bread


Breaking the bread, the Presider says

A Homily for Easter Day 2020 The Rev'd Dr Max Wood

As we reflect upon Easter, the event and core aspect of our Christian faith, one of its characteristics to me, if we are to apply a modern term to it, is portability.

Orthodox Christian teaching maintains that the Resurrection did occur as an historical event in the economy of human and salvation history. It happened at a particular time, at a particular place in the world.

There was a Garden. There was a tomb into which the crucified Jesus' body had been laid. While our Gospel accounts differ on the precise events on what we refer to as the first Easter Sunday, we just heard Matthew's version, what they <u>all</u> testify to, is the reality of Jesus' resurrection in the economy of human and salvation history. It has a static aspect to it.

But in another important sense, the Resurrection of Jesus, has a portable aspect to it as well. As a theological reality, its application is universal and portable.

In the famous prologue to his gospel, John talks of Jesus, the Word, as being "in the beginning", as being "with God", and being "God". Jesus, is part of the divine intention, and life sustaining of the beginning and subsequently of all of creation.

And if we accept that you can't separate the Resurrection from Jesus, then the Resurrection is part of the divine intention, and life sustaining of the beginning and subsequently of all of creation.

It has, what I'm terming, this portability aspect.

It is always present and applicable. And we can use and draw strength and courage from what we believe about Resurrection, as much today, as any day, past or future.

So where am I heading with all this?

Well, like, as I imagine, will be suggested in thousands of Easter Sermons around the world today, Resurrection promises us, that although times can be dark, and troubling, can be filled with anguish, fear, confusion, or despair, God's love in Resurrection promises us that this situation, will not ultimately prevail or be victorious. Resurrection promises us that even death, will not ultimately prevail or be victorious.

This doesn't make the dark and troubling times any less dark or troubling. But what it offers is the hope that they will pass, and the hope, that they will not ultimately win. John said: "the light shined in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it". This present situation is dark, but God assures us he will not let it overcome us.

This does not mean things will go back to how they were in every sense. The example of the Resurrected Jesus as recorded in the Gospels, does not present a "resuscitated Jesus", a Jesus who died and came back identical to how he was before.

The Gospels present a "resurrected Jesus", where there were aspects of change and continuity with the Jesus his followers knew before. And so it will be for us.

Many aspects of life will change from before. But the promise of Resurrection is that they will not end. The Resurrected Jesus demonstrates that even the worst death imaginable, will not be the end and will not ultimately be victorious.

And this is the surety and hope that we can take hold of today, even in our darkness, and for all eternity.
