Introduction

The Lord be with you. All: And also with you.

Dear Friends in Christ: in the name of the Word who was made flesh and dwelt among us, I welcome you. As we come to the beginning of this season of Christmas, let it be our duty and our joy to hear once more the message of the angels, to go to Bethlehem and see the Son of God lying in a manger.

As we meet to celebrate anew the coming of God's kingdom, we hear revealed the mystery of God's loving purpose for us - how that when we were far off, God met us in his Son and brought us home; how God humbled himself to take our human nature, that we might share God's divine glory.

Let us then so celebrate this coming with our carols and hymns of praise, that our lives may be charged with Jesus Christ's life; that we may bear witness to Christ's glory and so bring light to those who sit in darkness.

So first, we pray for those among whom Christ was born: the poor and helpless, the aged and young children; the hungry, the homeless and the refugee; the victims of poverty and oppression, the sick and those who mourn, the lonely and the unloved; those in despair or in the shadow of death.

Then, as we hear again the message of peace on earth and goodwill among all God's people, we pray for the leaders of the nations, that all may be inspired to work together for the establishment of justice, freedom and peace the world over.

Finally, as we rejoice with Mary and Joseph, St Luke, and all the Saints in heaven and on earth, we remember all who have gone before us with the sign of faith, whose hope was in the Word made flesh, Jesus Christ our Lord, through whom we offer up our prayers for the coming of his Kingdom, in the words he himself has taught us, praying together:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory for ever and ever. Amen.

ANTHEM: THE VERY BEST TIME OF THE YEAR


Christmas trees and boughs of holly, Yuletide logs and mistletoe; Candles burning bright, and meadows frosty white, and faces in the firelight glow;


