As a parish family, in 2022, we have been able to worship together regularly, socialise together and grow closer as a committed community of faith. Some of us have








The Festival of All Saints and 'We'll Gather Lilacs' Concert

Patronal Sermon – Précis

Luke (Ch 10.1-9) alone tells us that Jesus sent seventy to go ahead of him and sent them together because the journey involved dangers to be faced. Courage is needed, faith is needed, support and care of one another is needed. We are given to one another for the work so that alone we are not discouraged, and alone not lambs of Christ's own flock to be picked off by hungry wolves.

None of this is easy. The big picture is daunting. We now live in times that are at best indifferent to the Christian faith. Increasingly there is hostility towards the Church - too often with good reason - though sometimes it is hard to find more than unreflective animosity in some of the rejections we experience. We had better be ready for being among the seventy. As with any journey, it begins with that first step and all the small steps that follow. There is an urgency to our task in a time when all that God offers is so badly needed, and yet God, the source of life and love, is so widely rejected.

We are to speak words of peace wherever we go. 'Peace be to this house, the seventy were told to say. As we bring to those we meet each day God's longing to enfold them in love and newness of life, we are used by God to bring the kingdom close to them. Each word that diffuses anger and resentment, each act that supports and cares for another, each speaking of truth to power carried forward God's mission. Every letter to a politician advocating for those unable to speak up for themselves, every donation to a foodbank, every caring act, every refusal to be hostile even to the hostile, all these seemingly simple daily things, things we can all do, these things bring in God's way, God's kingdom, God's peace, as God enables us, you the parish, to be among those whom Jesus sends out. Be like the seventy, and you will truly be worthy of your patron saint's name.

2022 Sydney Diocesan Synod Report

The 3rd ordinary session of the 52nd Sydney Diocesan Synod commenced with an opening service and the Presidential Address at Oran Park Anglican College on Saturday 10th September 2022.

The Synod then moved to the Wesley Theatre in Pitt Street for five more days of Synod discussions on 12th, 13th, 14th, 19th and 20th September. This 3rd ordinary session of Synod passed 57 resolutions, 9 ordinances and filled 59 positions on boards and committees. St. Luke's was represented by our Rector, Paula Turner and Dr Jocelyn Chey.

The Presidential Address was delivered by our new Archbishop The Most Reverend Kanishka Raffel. The address discussed providing Anglican ministry to new growth areas of Sydney, multicultural Sydney, indigenous ministry, youth ministry in schools and churches, domestic violence and

the doctrine of marriage. The text and video of this address can be found on the Sydney Anglicans website.

Some of the key financial decisions made during this year's Synod included:

- The preparation by Standing Committee of a diocesan-wide ministry-directed property strategy.
- The passing of an ordinance (Parochial Cost Recoveries Ordinance 2022) committing parishes to the Land Acquisition

Levy over the next ten years to acquire land in areas marked for development before development plans are in place.

- The payment of \$250,000 per year until 2031 to the Diocese of Bathurst for the cost of a Bishop and his Registrar.
- The establishment of a centralised investment vehicle for the Diocese in the Glebe Administration Board.

Other important decisions included:

The acceptance of an amendment to the approach to meetings of, and financial contributions to, the General Synod.

Highlights included:

- A lengthy debate regarding a motion to give thanks for the life and work of Archbishop Desmond Tutu.
- A secret ballot and vote in houses (lay and clergy) re the withdrawal from fellowship in national church or provincial contexts.




- A question about Synod membership by Paula Turner being ruled "out of order."
- The presentation of a gift, a wooden black and white cross in the shape of a boomerang, to the Archbishop by Indigenous minister The Reverend Michael Duckett.
- The withdrawal of a motion affirming the so-called Diocese of the Southern Cross following a number of proposed amendments by our Rector, Dr Max Wood.
- A presentation by two Year 12 students attending Sydney Anglican schools.

If I was asked to summarise this year's Synod I would say that it was mostly about money: money parishes will be required to pay if they own property, money parishes will be required to pay to acquire land and money parishes will be required to pay to the Diocese of Bathurst. St Luke's, therefore, as a parish in the Diocese of Sydney, as a consequence of this year's Synod, is now required to contribute more financially to the Diocese. This is not a good outcome for St Luke's but it is a done deal which we have to embrace.

Church Roof Replacement

The Wardens were successful with a grant application in 2021, which resulted in St Luke's being awarded \$41,000 by the NSW State Government to replace the church roof. The successful tender went to the contractor, Dreamroof,



recommended by the Sydney
Diocesan Secretariat as they had
previously satisfactorily completed
roof works on a number of Anglican
churches. On the recommendation
of the roofing specialists, all metal
roofs and flashings were replaced at
a total cost of \$44,055 plus GST.

The work took place during March 2022 and was rain interrupted several times. Upon completion of the work, Felicity Wilson, Member for North Shore in the NSW Legislative Assembly, met with Fr Max to inspect the new roof.






Bon Voyage and Welcome
